WHAT STOOD OUT	WHAT DOES IT MEAN
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Today, we're looking at the final moments before the first Easter. We typically call this the triumphal entry. But even though Jesus is a King, he doesn't enter with trumpets, fanfare, and war horses. Instead, he enters in humility on a donkey, the symbol of peace, and everyday people shouting his coming. This paints such a vivid picture of His kingship, doesn't it? It begs the question: How do we welcome Jesus into the nooks and crannies of our lives? How do we embrace Him, not just with open arms but with a spirit washed in humility?

How do I welcome Jesus into the various areas of my life (home, work, relationships), and what areas might I be withholding or trying to keep Him out of?
In what ways do my human hopes or expectations of Jesus match or differ from His fundamental role and presence in my life as King, Friend, Saviour, Teacher, and Brother?
How can I practice humility and servanthood in my daily life, following the example of Jesus choosing to enter Jerusalem on the back of a donkey?

JESUS CLEARS THE TEMPLE

WHAT STOOD OUT	WHAT DOES IT MEAN
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When Jesus decided to cleanse the temple, He was doing much more than simply overturning tables and driving out merchants. He offered us a powerful symbol of what He desires for our hearts and lives. We can see that this notorious act of Jesus was far more than merely protesting organizational or individual corruption; it was a profound declaration about the essence and importance of pure worship and righteousness. Worshiping God is not about the things we do; it's about the order of our Hearts and who is at the center.

What are the "temples" in my life that need cleansing, areas where commercialism or sin has taken precedence over or contaminated true worship and devotion?
How can I make my life more of a house of prayer and a place where God's presence is honored and revered?
In what ways am I guilty of superficial worship, and how can I cultivate a more sincere and heartfelt relationship with God?

THE PLOT AGAINST JESUS

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The story of Judas betraying Jesus provides a stark portrayal of our own propensity for disloyalty. Human betrayal of Jesus isn't limited to Jesus' final moments before his death; this story is a mirror held up to our hearts right now, urging us to confront our broken, sinful nature and the choices we make in our relationship with Christ. Not to lead us to despair but to deepen our understanding of what it means to follow Jesus; this is a call to embrace the cost of discipleship, to acknowledge our weaknesses, and to rely more fully on His strength and grace.

Have I ever felt betrayed by someone I trusted? How might reflecting on Jesus' betrayal by Judas help me to process and find healing in my own experiences of betrayal?
In what ways might I be betraying Jesus with my actions or inactions?
How can I guard my heart against the temptations that lead to betrayals of my faith and values?

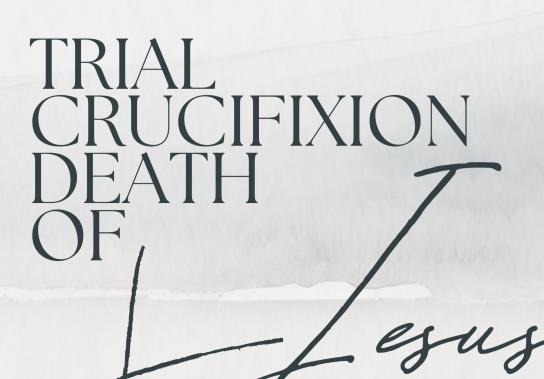

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On the eve of His crucifixion, Jesus chose to spend His final hours in intimate fellowship with those He called friends and disciples. During the Passover meal, Jesus broke bread and shared his cup, and in doing so, He laid out the new covenant, marked by His body given for us and His blood shed for the forgiveness of sins. Then he left us with this commandment: "Do this in remembrance of me." Each time we come to the Lord's table, let us do so with a mindful spirit of reverence and worship, remembering not just the pain and sacrifice but also the victory and hope that the Last Supper signifies.

How can I embody the commandment to "Do this in remembrance of me" in my daily life beyond participating in communion? Name some ways.
How does the Last Supper inspire me to live out the values of sacrifice, service, and love in my interactions with others? What might this look like in my life?
What areas of my life need to be surrendered more fully to God's will, as Jesus surrendered His will to the Father?

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Let's take a deep breath and truly soak in the enormity of what Jesus did for us. Think about the journey on which He willingly embarked, the unimaginable depth of His suffering, and the boundless ocean of His love that held Him there on the cross on our behalf. That cross is infinitely more than just wood and nails; it's a symbol that speaks limitless volumes about sacrifice, love, and redemption - the very essence of God's divine nature. It whispers to us (and sometimes shouts) the inexhaustible lengths He would go to to bring us back to Him. The cross is not merely a symbol of what was but a call to what is possible: a life lived fully in the light of His love and grace.

How does reflecting on the suffering and death of Jesus impact my understanding and my daily practice of sacrificial love?
Where do I see the impact of sin in my life and in the broader world? How does the cross offer a solution?
What does the phrase "It is finished" mean to me personally?

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Lean into the quiet, the stillness, and the waiting in which Holy Saturday envelops us. It's this sacred pause where we sit with the heaviness of Jesus' passing, feeling that echo of despair His friends, loved ones, and followers must have felt. This sacred pause allows us to reflect on those times we've found ourselves waiting in a dark and brokenhearted unknown, holding our breath for God to show up in our lives. Holy Saturday is a day that invites us into the deep and uncomfortable spaces in our hearts, makes space for us to wrestle with our waiting, our doubt, and our longing - and to remember, even in the silence, that God stirs.

How do I deal with the "in-between" times of life when God seems silent or distant? What's my track record?
What might I learn from the waiting, the doubt, and the longing experienced by Jesus' followers after his death and in the long hours leading up to his resurrection?
How can I deepen my trust in God's promises amid difficult seasons of waiting, doubt, and longing?
